

PRODUCTION NOTE

Place & Time: England, 1790s

PRODUCTION STAFF

ACT ONE

Takes place first at Norland Park, the Dashwood estate in Sussex, and then moves between Barton Park, the Middleton estate in Devon, and the Dashwood Cottage on the grounds of Barton Park. Act I takes place over the course of several months in spring and late summer.

No time passes between the acts.

ACT TWO

Begins at the Dashwood Cottage at Barton Park on the same day, then moves to Mrs. Jennings' London home the next December, and travels to various London locations, including the Fitzgerald's ball, and the Ferrars' family home in London, over the course of several weeks. The action then moves to the Palmer Country House in Cleveland for several more weeks before returning to the Dashwood Cottage at Barton Park, again, in the spring.

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

250 years ago, in 1775, the esteemed British novelist Jane Austen was born. 200 years ago, in 1826, Lafayette College was founded. The coming together of two such auspicious events in our 2025-2026 Theater Department season at Lafayette makes it an excellent time to celebrate the work of Jane Austen and to both look back at our history, and forward with a contemporary adaptation of Austen's Sense and Sensibility by playwright Kate Hamill. I saw the premiere of this production at Bedlam Theater Company in

New York with Hamill playing the role of Marianne back in 2014, and was enchanted by the delightful comedy and the endlessly moving furniture that made up the set. Hamill found an ingenious way to mine the comedy already present in Austen's work and to create a physical theater production that embraced both modern and period details.

I have long been a lover of Jane Austen's novels and have made several pilgrimages to important places from Austen's life and works during my time on various trips to England. But what of the connection between Austen and the college's founding? Sense and Sensibility was written and set in the 1790s and was the first of Austen's novels to be published, but not until much later, on Oct. 30th 1811, now 214 years ago. Its publication date was relatively close to the College's founding, and as a recent exhibition at the Morgan Museum and Library in New York City in celebration of Jane Austen's 250th birthday pointed out,

Austen's work was actually known and sought after in early America. The exhibition included several early copies of her novel Emma, published in 1815, which were circulating among American readers as early as 1816. There is a reasonable chance then, that the earliest students at Lafayette might have heard of Austen and her work, which has, of course, gained fame worldwide and rarely been out of print in the 200 plus years since its publication. This is the third time I've tackled the ever popular Austen while at Lafayette. Our campus has already seen productions of Pride and Prejudice, adapted by Jon Jory, and Emma! A Pop Musical, which we performed electronically in the very early days of the pandemic, and I am delighted to bring Austen to campus once again. In celebration of her 250th birthday and the College's 200th birthday, we will be hosting a joint birthday party following the final 2 PM matinee performance of Sense and Sensibility on October 26th in a celebration open to all. We are fortunate that this production received generous support from the Lafayette Bicentennial Academic Fund, as well as from our English Department colleagues who were especially helpful by inviting our theater students to join their department field trip to the aforementioned Morgan Library Exhibition celebrating Austen. The English Department, the Women's and Gender Studies Program and the Lafayette College Library have banded together to support the celebration of the College and Austen after our final performance.

I would be remiss in not noting another major landmark that is occurring in our Department this year. This production is my first collaboration with Professor Jeff Helm, from the Mechanical Engineering Department, though Professor Helm has both designed the sets for, and acted in, a total of thirteen productions during his time at Lafayette. I am so delighted to finally have a chance to work with him, though I am sad to say that this production marks our final Departmental collaboration with Professor Helm, as he is set to retire. Our department is stronger for having worked with Jeff, and in the course of his tenure, we developed the Theater and Engineering Fellowship, which is a collaboration between Engineering students and the Theater Department that has been both rich and rewarding, and which represents, as Professor Helm does, the very best of what a Lafayette education can do.

Also on this production, due to the generosity of the Laros Foundation, we've been able to bring Chanler Sharpe on board as a professional Stage Manager to mentor several student Stage Managers and

Assistant Stage Managers. Chanler has been an invaluable addition to our program for this production and we look forward to seeing their legacy through the future stage management work of these promising students. Professor Helm's mobile set, which features the clever use of video projections, is supported by returning guest artist Kia Rogers, who designed the gargeous lighting for this production. I'm also thrilled to have Will Morris back with us for a second year to design the elegant period costumes that anchor the show in its period. We've been especially fortunate to have three student designers working on the production as well-senior Emma Li is the Associate Costume Designer and produced and created the looks for both Elinor and Marianne. Senior Laura Coffey created the intricate hair designs that are true to the period. Junior Kylie Brotz is supporting Kia Rogers' lighting design in preparation for her plans next year to design a college production as lighting designer for her senior project. Finally, as always, I am pleased to be working again with Lafayette alum Tom DiGiovanni and with my new Excel scholar Daly Gibson, who together crafted the intricate live piano accompaniment for the production that Daly executes so beautifully on stage at every performance.

My talented team, our gifted student actors, technicians, designers and I hope you enjoy this lovely show, and that you celebrate both Jane Austen and Lafayette College during this exciting anniversary year.

THTR 102 Basic Stagecraft [HAA, HUM]

This course is a hands-on introduction to the world of stagecraft where you will explore the technology, both old and new, utilized to create magical environments for the live performing arts. We will examine the myriad ways technology empowers artists to engage, inspire, and move audiences with their performances and learn how and when to utilize various scenic, lighting, sound, and costume tools, techniques, and technology to build convincing and compelling landscapes for performers and audiences alike. And, even if you never plan on working in the performing arts, you'll

develop practical skills for use around your future home and hone your skills in collaboration and creativity, both highly prized by all industries. We live in challenging times. We are surrounded by social and racial injustices, like unequal access to healthcare, education, and food, and environmental problems like fracking, air pollution, and—of course—climate change. This course asks two questions: 1. How might all of these problems be connected to one another? And 2. How can theater serve to highlight these interconnected problems while still offering hope for the future? Students will analyze, evaluate, and create environmental art that speaks to their lived experience and to the experiences of others.

Students will direct a short play for a public performance.

THTR 340 Queer Theater [H, W, V/ HAH, W, CECS]

What is queer theater and what can it do? Is it an identity and/or a practice? How does it center LGBTQ+ lives, and how has it and its reception changed over time? Analyzing queer, U.S.-based theater from 1980 to today, we will explore LGBTQ+ and two-spirit performances that are queer in content and form. Students will queer a normative piece of theater, write a queer play, and develop their own queer theater canon.


